NESTUCCA NATIONAL FARM LOAN ASSOCIATION

Organization Perfected Yesterday Afternoon.

The Nestucca National Farm Loan Association was organized at Clover- KODAK AND KOdale yesterday afternoon with sixteen members. The association is formed under the United States Federal Loan act of 1916. Through the organization just the members may borrow for racnh improvements or to pay off present mortgages, from the United States of their property for forty years at a rate of interest not to exceed 6 per cent, the same being payable in yearly installments. After five years the borrower may, if he so desires, pay the principal.

D. J. Dunn is responsible for the organization and to him credit is due, he having personally sought the information and paid for the printing and mailthe invitations to assemble and organize the association.

W. J. Riechers and J. C. Holden, of the First National Bank, Tillamook, were present at the meeting and it was through Mr. Riechers that the information regarding the organization and first steps to be taken was had.


