Death of Thomas H. Penter.

On Saturday evening last at 6 o'clock occurred the death of Thomas H. Penter, a highly respected pioneer rancher of the Nestucca Valley. Mr. Penter had been in poor health on account of his advanced age, for some time, but as he improved some last week, hope was entertained for his recovery. A turn for the worse took place last Saturday and he did not rally.

The remains were laid to rest Monday afternoon in the Oretown cemetery. Mr. Penter was born in Arkansas August 29, 1838, and was married to Miss Sarah A. Miles in 1864. To this union there were two boys and three girls born.

Mr. and Mrs. Penter came to the Nestucca Valley in 1883.

Besides the widow there remains to mourn his death Dell, who is on the ranch with his widowed mother, William, of Oretown, Mrs. Minnie Whitman, of Oretown, Mrs. Pearl Fraser, of Otis, and Mrs. Ada Mattoon, of Hebo.

To Use Whey in Butter Making.

There is being installed in the Central Creamery a whey separating and butter making machine. Instead of returning the whey to the ranchers to be fed to hogs, the butter making qualities in the whey will be separated and made into butter. The whey will be somewhat lessened in feeding quality but will remain of some value as hog feed. The amount of butter that can be made from the whey is not so large, but sufficient enough to make it a paying proposition. Those interested and experienced say that it takes more than an expert to tell the difference in the butter from that made in the regular way from whole cream.

Is Improving.

Deep has been the interest this week felt by the many friends of Everett Landingham, who was operated upon at the Nestucca Valley Hospital last week. It was learned after making an incision that instead of having gall stones, the trouble was that of the stomach. For a time it was feared he would not recover, but later reports are to the effect that he is improving and having been so advised will leave, as soon as able, for California where the climate will be better for his condition.
