Age for Army Registration.

Every man between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, on the day soon to be proclaimed by President Wilson for the war census.

There will be no exception to this rule. Even if a man belongs to one of the exempt class, he nevertheless must register if he is between 21 and 30 years of age. The government will determine who is to be exempt after its records are complete.

Brigadier General George A. White, adjutant general of Oregon, working under the direction of Governor James Withycombe, has put the machinery to work and his first request of every man affected by the census is that he make a careful study of its provisions to eliminate all possible confusion at the polls.

Notice to Alien Enemies.

All alien enemies of the United States of America are hereby notified to surrender at once to the sheriff of Tillamook County, Oregon, or to one of his regular deputies, any and all of the following articles which they may have in their possession, to-wit:

Any firearm, weapon, or implement of war, or component part thereof, ammunition, maxim or other silencer, bomb, or explosive, or material used in the manufacture of explosive; any aircraft or wireless apparatus, or any form of signal device, or any form of cipher code, or any paper, document, or book written or printed in cipher or in which there may be invisible writing.

Notice of Filing of Commissioners' Report for the Big Nestucca Drainage District.

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested in the land included within the Big Nestucca Drainage District, Tillamook, Oregon, the boundary lines of which are as follows:

Beginning at a point on the south bank of the Big Nestucca River, where the quarter section line running north and south through section 29, in township 4, south of range 10 west, of Willamette Meridian intersects said river; thence south to the quarter section corner on the south line of section 29, thence south 80 rods to the 1-16th section line running east and west through the north half of section 32, thence east along said 1-16th section line 160 rods to the east line of section 32; thence south 80 rods to the quarter section corner between sections 32 and 33, thence east 160 rods to the center of section 33; thence north 80 rods to the 1-16th line; thence east 320 rods to the quarter section line running north and south through section 34; thence north 320 rods along the quarter section line running north and south through sections 34 and 27 to the 1-16th line running east and west through the north half of section 27; thence east 80 rods to the center of the northeast quarter of section 27; thence north 80 rods to the north line of section 27; thence west along the north line of section 27 to the county road leading south from Cloverdale, thence northerly along said county road to where said road intersects the 1-16th
