BOTH BOND ISSUES CARRY

The County Bond Issue Soars Nearly Three to One.

The State Bond Measure Has a Majority of Over 20,000-- Now for Hardsurface Roads.

Monday last witnessed the most interesting election ever held in Tillamook County. The agitation for hardsurface roads had been started over three years ago and bonding the county to get the roads discussed many times. A real campaign of education was not put on foot, however, until about a year ago, when it was decided that the surest way to get the voters to bond for hardsurface roads was to open every channel of information that could be had.

F. R. Beals headed this campaign of education, and through his untiring efforts and the expenditure of considerable time, every phase of the bonding question was given to the voters for discussion, and to him credit is due for a good part of the splendid result of the county election.

The latest reports show that the state bonding measure carried by better than 20,000 majority.

OPPOSED DRAFT LAW.

Circulated Literature Containing Articles Against Selective Service.

At Detroit, Michigan ten men were taken into custody by federal authorities on charges of conspiring to oppose enforcement of the selective draft law this week. They were each held under bonds of \$1000 which they could not furnish.

The charge against the prisoners specifically is that they circulated literature urging opposition to the selective draft law. Among them is the editor of the Michigan Socialist, which contained the anti-conscription articles. Leaflets containing similar writings also are said to have been distributed. It is said that more than 100,000 copies of the paper and leaflets were passed out Sunday and Monday, chiefly among workers in factories.

The names of several others who, it is alleged, took part in the distribution of the paper and leaflets, are understood to have been given to representatives here of the department of justice.

Call for Bids for Bonds and Construction Work.

The Big Nestucca Drainage District will receive bids for the construction of ditches according to its plan of reclamation up to 10 o'clock a. m., June 23rd, 1917, and will also receive bids for the sale of \$8000.00 of its bonds to be issued for paying expenses of construction up to the same time.

A certificate check for five per cent of the amount of each bid is required to insure that successful bidder will take and pay for bonds or enter into contract with approved bond for doing the work awarded. Bids will be opened at Tillamook, Oregon, on the date mentioned, and may be sent in care of H. T. Botts, attorney for the district, at that place.

Bids for construction may be made for separate sections of the work.
