### TRIP TO SEASIDE AND ASTORIA

The County Court Made the Loop Via Neah-Kah-Nie Mountain.

Commissioner Frank Owens informed the Courier this morning that last Monday the County Court made a trip to Seaside and Astoria and returned to Tillamook by the Neah Kah-Nie Mountain road. They autoed back from Seaside as far as Arch Cape, enjoying a pleasant ride on Cannon Beach. At Arch Cape they started on foot over the Neah-Kah-Nie hotel in about two and a half hours. Mr. Owens informs as that Clatsop County has a graded road to its county line with nothing greater than a seven per cent grade. ### WAR BULLETIN.

Within a few days official lists of the draft serial numbers, showing the order in which they were drawn in the lottery at Washington, will reach the various county exemption boards. Following receipt of these lists, the boards will notify the men called up on the first draft.

Until then it will not be necessary for those subject to call on the first draft to report. But as soon as they receive notification from their boards, they must report promptly on the day designated.

The first step taken by each board will be to post in a conspicuous place a list containing the names of all the men registered in its county or district, in the exact order in which they will be called on the first and all succeeding drafts. A copy of this list will be given the press for publication.

Let it be emphasized again that this list will have not only the names of the men to be called out on the first draft, but of every man registered, in the order in which he must be called. No person whatsoever has any authority to change this order.

Having posted this list and given a copy to the press, the board will then notify by letter every man called up on the first draft. Each man will be directed to appear before the board for physical examination on a specified date, which will be within seven days of the mailing of the notice.

Failure to receive this notice will not be accepted as an excuse for not appearing on the day set. The burden of appearing when he is called is on himself; there is a heavy penalty for failure to answer the call.

Remember, that regardless of whether a man intends to apply for exemption or discharge, he must appear for physical examination on the day set. He has seven days from the posting of the list and the mailing of the notice to him by the board in which to file application for exemption, and 10 more days in which to file proof.

And remember again, that no claims for exemption because of employment in necessary industries, including agriculture, can be considered by your county exemption board.

Such a claim must be made to one of the three district appeal boards, at Portland, Eugene or LaGrande. It can only be made then after the man has passed his physical examination and been certified by the county board as called for military service and not exempt.

After you have appeared before your county exemption board and passed the physical examination, it will be some time before you will be actually called out to join the army. You will be notified when it is time for you to report for service.

## AGRICULTURAL NOTES

### Silo Progress.

Some Tillamook dairymen are rising well to the food shortage situation and preparing to keep the cows at work as long as possible this fall and winter. Think what it would mean if everyone of our 10,000 cows could have silage this winter and held up their milk so as to produce even 100 lbs. more than they would on dry hay. This would mean 100,000 lbs. more cheese from the county this year. At 25c per pound this would mean \$25,000 income to the county. The above increase is based on very conservative estimates. Instead of 100 lbs. more milk per cow per year I have no doubt that the wise use of silage would increase the production 500 lbs. per year or 500,000 lbs. of cheese for the county. See what this would mean in this year of food shortage. Our greatest lack at the present time is meat animals. Cheese is a substitute for meat. It is up to every dairyman to keep his cows milking to their capacity this fall and winter, and if he is not prepared with a silo this year not to let another year go by without.

The silo at all times, and particularly now, offers to the farmer one of the best means of reducing his feed bills. The present great national emergency places these great questions before every farmer who keeps cattle: Have you a silo? If you have not your herd is not most economically fed; why not build a silo and fill it before frost comes? If you have one is it big enough to supply all the silage your cattle can eat before the next crop is harvested? If not, build another. You can buy one ready to erect, or you can build one yourself. Homemade silos of concrete or wood can be erected with little trouble.

### Silos More Than Doubled This Year.

There has been some 30 to 35 silos built this year which is an increase of about 175 per cent. in the silos of the county. This is a start but does not by any means measure the number that should have been built.

### The Silo Saves Grain.

Which is needed for human consumption and at the same time keeps up the milk flow.
