FIVE MILES MORE OF HARD SURFACE

The State to pay \$10,000 a Mile, the County to put the Road in Condition.

News reached Tillamook Tuesday that the State Highway Commission was ready with \$50,000 to hard surface five miles of road between Tillamook and Cloverdale this season, the county to put the roadbed in condition for hardsurfacing.

The pavement is to be 16 feet wide, same as the present piece of pavement this side of Tillamook and the state is to pay \$10,000 per mile toward the hardsurfacing.

This bit of good news is received with much satisfaction. Whether the five miles of pavement is to be contiguous and start from the present pavement is not stated, but it is presumed that such will be the case.
