The postmaster at Cloverdale has just received her notification of increased letter postage. The rate is three cents per ounce or fraction thereof on letters and other first-class matter except drop letters. All drop letters, that is, letters mailed for delivery from the office at which posted, including those for delivery by city, rural, or other carriers of such office, are required to have postage paid on them at the rate of two cents an ounce or fraction thereof. Postal cards are required to be prepaid two cents, and, therefore the one cent postal cards must have a one-cent postage stamp affixed to them in addition to the one-cent stamp impressed on on such cards. Post cards, private mailing cards, bearing written messages must have two cents postage prepaid on them. This rule takes effect tomorrow, November 2.

TILLAMOOK NEWS NOTES.

District Attorney Scents Booze—Good Showing in Tax Collection—Seditious Hobo Locked up.

On information given to District Attorney Goyno Monday that a shipment of liquor had been received here Saturday, he got busy and search warrants were issued and a box containing thirty quarts of whisky was found, also an empty box, just like the full one, was found on the premises of a local hotel here. The booze was labeled Underwood Typewriters and marked to one of the local drug stores. The case is causing considerable interest at this time as it is thought several parties are interested. There has been no arrests made yet. Attorney Goyno and Sheriff Campbell are working farther on the case.

From a statement made at the tax collector's office we have the following figures showing amount of taxes collected up to and including October 5th: Amount collected \$396,105.64; and on the delinquent rolls over \$18,000.00 have been collected. There is delinquent on the current rolls between \$31,000.00 and \$32,000.00. This is considered a good showing by those in the office.

A German hobo giving his name as Nik Weiland was arrested and placed in the county jail on Sunday. He is a trapper and has been traveling over the county the past month, also worked some picking blackberries and digging potatoes. While at Hemlock Sunday morning he engaged in conversation with Ed Anderson regarding the war and stated he would like to see the kaiser win, then there would be no more war and we would all be under one rule. Mr. Anderson informed him he was sitting under the American flag and had said enough, whereupon he left and Mr. Anderson telephoned Deputy Sheriff Stanley at Tillamook and he assisted by Deputy Sheriff Webb and District Attorney Goyno arrested the man and placed him in the county jail. He is held awaiting instructions from the United States attorney in Portland.

Inexpensive Lighting.

Many of the peasant class in Spain make use of the bark of the cork oak to light their cottages at night. The bark is placed in a kettle, from which protrudes a spout, and when it is hot enough it gives off a gas which burns with considerable brilliancy.

The lighting is not expensive, and the peasant is careful to save the carbonized cork refuse, for he can sell it, as it is known commercially as "Spanish black," one of the intensest black-browns known among pigments.—London Standard.

How His Wife Helped.
