Former Tillamook County Citizen Passes Away at Dallas.

Louis Fleck formerly a well known and highly respected rancher of Tillamook County, died at Dallas Saturday last at the age of 76 years, three months and six days.

Mr. Fleck came to Tillamook County in the early days and with other pioneers did his bit toward making Tillamook County habitable. For a number of years he and his family owned and lived on the ranch now owned and occupied by Chas. McKillip.

After a residence in this county of 35 years he moved on a ten acre piece near Dallas where he spent his declining years as a retired rancher. About six months ago he was stricken with paralysis which ultimately in his death. His entire family was at his bedside when the end came.
