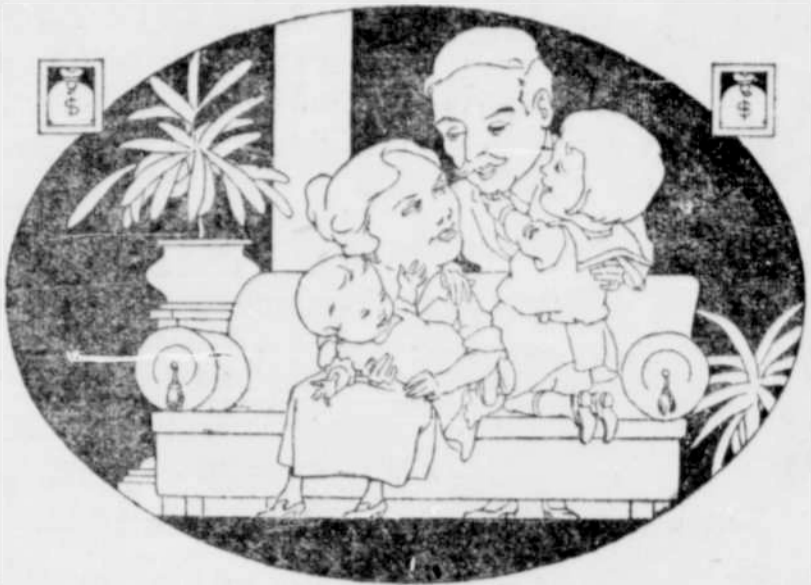

FEW LUXURIES ARE POSSIBLE.

When the American soldier goes abroad he carries a little pack about two feet long and not more than eight inches in diameter. It contains everything the soldier carries. He is limited to the bare necessities; all the little luxuries—the candy, magazines, chewing gum, and so on, that a fellow spends his nickels and dimes and quarters for ordinarily—have to be left behind.

Moreover, the army can't always carry these things along; ammunition and food and fodder get the first call. What's more, the soldier can not take a homey atmosphere along with him, for barracks at best are often unhomelike, and even they have to be given up when the army takes the field or goes to France. All those mellowing influences of home and friends and accustomed facilities for pleasure, rest and recreation are more or less foreign to the bald unadmirable life of the soldier and sailor, too.

The Y. M. C. A. saw this, and said in effect: "Every American soldier must have a place in camp where he can get a touch of home, where he can play games and read and write, and relax from his military life and discipline. And the sailor must have the same at the base ports. Nothing is too good for these men, and the Y. M. C. A. is going along to war with the army and navy to do for the soldiers and sailors what you fathers mothers and friends and relatives would do for them if you could get to them."

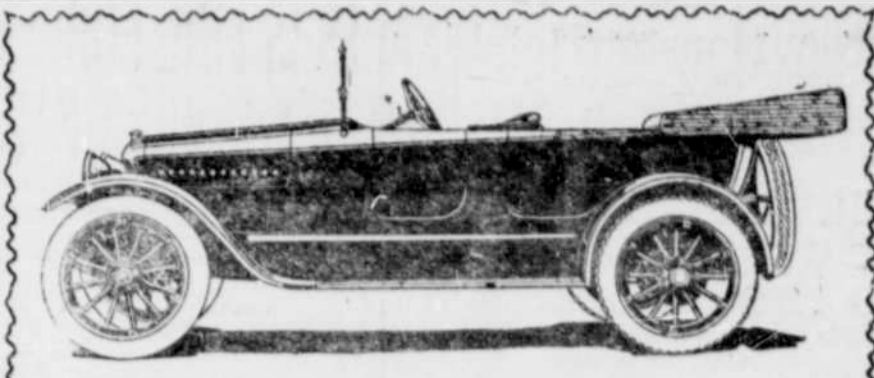

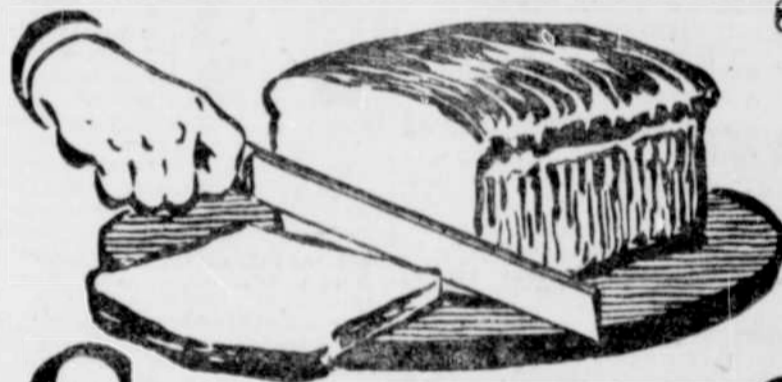
