Frank Cross attended the meeting, brought his tool kit, sharpened shears and adjusted machines. This work was much needed and was appreciated by the ladies, now if some of the other men want to help there is some work that needs splitting. Some of the ladies have been giving one and two days a week aside from the regular meeting day.

The Thrift Campaign.

Monday evening the county school superintendent had received teachers' reports from seven schools in the county on the Thrift movement.

The reports filed show as follows: Number of Liberty Bonds owned by pupils, 2; amount invested in in Liberty Bonds by pupils, \$100; number of pupils owning War Saving certificates, 24; amount invested in War Saving certificates, \$138.37; number of pupils owning Thrift Stamps, 100; amount invested in Thrift Stamps, 102.25; number of pupils having money in savings bank, 47.

The Boy City school made a record for itself by selling to persons outside of the school war savings certificates and thrift stamps to the amount of \$590.16.

As the reports come in it will be seen that the schools are doing most excellent work in this line.
