**Letter from R. Y. Blalock.**  
Redlands, Calif., Feb. 24, 1918.  
Cloverdale Courier:  
We arrived here Dribay. When we  
left Tillamook it was clear and the sun  
shining bright. We had started to  
sunny California, but as soon as we  
crossed the Siskiyou Mountains into  
California it commenced to look like  
Tillamook, at its best in November,  
with the signs good for a rain, cloudy  
all around and the rain pouring down  
in the middle. It kept it up for two  
days. The people said, "this is what  
we have been praying for." It means  
millions to California and to help win  
the war. We had not been here but a  
few hours until we spied a big well fed  
man in an Oregon car going by. I  
thought he looked like a Tillamooker.  
I called his name and he stopped his  
car and looked back and I went up to  
him and we soon renewed our acquaint-  
ance for it had only been a few months  
since he came down here for the winter.  
He took Mrs. Blalock and myself out  
to Yucapia yesterday where there is a  
large section of country being put into  
apple and peach orchards. This is a  
pretty place. The orange crop was near-  
ly a failure which makes times dull  
here. But if we could live on beauty  
and climate we could do well here.  
Well, Mr. and Mrs. Werschkul are  
coming to take Mrs. Blalock and myself  
for a ride, so we will have to close.  
Mrs. Blalock is tired and worn out from  
the trip, otherwise she is no worse than  
when we left. Mrs. Werschkul seems  
to be better than she was.
