These statements are both in error as F. R. Beals herd of 16 holsteins averaged 1270 pounds milk and 41.7 pounds fat. J. L. Gay's 8 Guernseys were second in fat production and third in milk production with 1053 pounds milk and 43.6 pounds fat. King's herd was third in fat production. Craven's herd was second in milk production with 1124.6 pound milk per cow.

DIFFER OVER ORIGIN OF DOG

Whether All Kinds Had a Common Ancestor Has Long Been a Matter of Dispute.

The ancestry of the dog has been the occasion of much controversy, according to Leo S. Crandall's book, "Pets." Many naturalists have considered that it is descended from a single ancestor, such as the common wolf of Europe. Darwin, however, leans toward the theory of multiple origin, and advances much convincing proof in support of his belief. It is widely known that many savage tribes have dogs, which appear to be simply half-tamed representatives of the particular wild doglike animals inhabiting the same regions.

The dogs of the American plains Indians closely resemble the small prairie wolf, or coyote; the husky of the north country is plainly not far removed from the gray wolf; the German sheep dog and the Samoyede are strikingly wolflike in appearance. Whether our present dogs are the result of crossing these many simple derivatives of wolves and Jackals among themselves, or whether there was an original ancestral dog, now extinct, with which the blood of other species has become mingled, we have not yet been able to determine, though so many primordial animal remains have come to light.

According to St. George Mivart, the dingo is the only wild dog still existing which meets the requirements of an ancestor of our modern breeds. This species is found throughout Australia and fossil bones which have been found show its presence there from very early times.

SPOTS OF LIFE IN DEAD SEA

Small Fish and Other Living Creatures Have Been Observed in Desolate Waters.

The Dead Sea is not quite so desolate as was represented by early writers, who pictured it as utterly without life, with sterile shores, and so pestilential that even birds flying over were liable to fall dead. Though 46 miles in length and more than 9 miles in greatest breadth, it is especially notable as being the greatest depression on the earth, its surface being 1,300 feet lower than that of the Mediterranean. The rainfall is slight, but the great volume of water poured in by the Jordan raises the surface 10 or 15 feet at times, though, with no outlet, this inflow is all evaporated in the dry season. The water has become very dense and bitter, while floating masses of bitumen ejected from the bottom and sulphur deposited from springs along the shore add to the unattractiveness. It is true that neither animal nor vegetable life is to be found in the saltiest parts of the sea, but Dr. W. G. Masterton, in an account to the Royal Geographical society, stated that near the shores, where small brackish streams find entrance, occur small fish, crabs and mosquito larvae. At a spot where he and other travelers saw fish actively swimming, the water was found to contain not less than 33.3 per cent of solids. There are many places along the shore where acres of reeds and many trees flourish, and at such spots birds and other animal life are abundant.

Innkeepers' Signs.

In the middle ages, before turnpikes were constructed, the castles of the barons and the monasteries offered shelter and food to travelers. The baronial arms were always hung before the castles in prominent positions, the object being to enable wayfaring strangers to identify a given house by the most conspicuous object in the device. Thus, if a rose, lily or lion appeared in bold relief the building was named by the traveler by one or other of these terms. After the overthrow of the feudal powers and the suppression of the monasteries the roadside hostelry was the only resource left to wanderers, and it took over the former custom by displaying signs.
