Improving Store Band Concert School Sept. 14

Gravel is being hauled and work progressing on the foundation for great improvements on the Richland Drug Store.

It is the intention to add 16 feet onto the rear and to raise the roof on the annex until all the building is under one gable roof. According to present calculations, a large plate glass front, with copious display recesses, will make an attractive feature of the improvement.

The wall now deviding the two rooms will be partially removed so as to allow customers entering the store to enter either department. In the annex, will be situated, the ice cream parlor and soda fountain, with a screened in porch in the rear, for the manufacturing of ice cream.

In the rear of the present main store, in the annex, will be located, the prescription department. This improvement will cost in the neighborhood of a thousand dollars and it shows that Chas. E. Barber has faith in the future of Eagle Valley and Richland.
