Large audiences were in attendance at the Red Cross meetings held at Richland on Sunday evening and at New Bridge on Monday morning. Judge Anderson, Senator Rand and Senator Strayer were the speakers, and the history and great work of the Red Cross organization throughout the civilized world was given in a concise manner. Attention was forcibly called to the urgent need for funds with which to provide hospitals, equip Red Cross units to go to Europe to assist in caring for the 10,000 men who are wounded every day, to send physicians and nurses with our armies, etc. The fact that many young men from Eagle Valley had already enlisted and that many from here would be drafted; that some of them would no doubt be wounded in battle, was vividly impressed upon the minds of the hearers, and an appeal made to each and every man, woman and child in the community to contribute to this great cause.

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Seven Thousand Million Dollars

America's war loan of seven thousand million dollars surpasses the powers of the mind to grasp, says Thomas F. Logan in Leslie's. Spent at the rate of a dollar a minute it would take 13,318 years to dispose of the appropriation. Loaned out at 6 per cent, \$13.00 could be spent every second for an indefinite period without touching the principal.

Converted into silver dollars, the coined pieces laid end to end would reach more than four times around the earth at the equator. Piled on top of one another, these silver dollars would extend nearly 600 miles in the air. Made into dollar bills, they would cover 26,686 acres.

Another and more cheerful way of looking at the situation is that great as the loan is, the wealth of the United States is such that it amounts to the lending of \$1 out of every \$40 of our existing tangible resources. A penny a day saved by every inhabitant would cancel the principal within twenty years.
