JUST A TRIP TO BAKER

The need for a better road between Richland and Baker is made strongly apparent by the letter printed below, which was written by Mr. Wm. J. Lechner of the Rand Realty Co., Baker:

"I sure had an awful trip from Richland to Baker on Sunday, Sept. 21st. My wife and self left there a few minutes after 7 and did not reach here until 5 p. m. It rained as you know all day. Climbing the Richland grade one of the chains came off a hind wheel and we tugged and pulled and backed for half an hour before we realized the trouble; at last two other autos came to my rescue, and, after getting the chain adjusted and putting on an extra heavy log chain, we reached the summit of the grade in safety. In getting 'out again and in again' I was covered with mud and drenched with rain, yet this was like a 'Summer Night's Dream' to what was to follow. Shortly after leaving Sparta the car skidded and ran off a culvert and how we escaped capsizing the good Lord only knows. After complimenting ourselves over our fortunate escape we sailed along until we reached the stone house at the top of the hill when we had a hind wheel blowout; our car skidded criss-cross twice and then plunged into a rail and barb wire fence, throwing rails in every di-

rection, snapping the wire and leaving us stranded in a plowed field. Well, after about two hours hard work and with the assistance of several passers-by, we managed to get started again. Every thing ran along smoothly for several miles when one of the front tires had a blow-out, stranding us for another hour or so. After we got started again we had no further trouble on our homeward journey. But she was some trip, Mr. Thorp, and one we shall never forget."

\$50 Reward for Deserters
