PHIL'S HAVING A TIME

Mr. Philip McLain writes from Mitchell, South Dakota, and says he is having a grand time but will soon leave for Michigan. He reports crops in that section fine and the weather good. The following clipping from the Mitchell Gazette shows that Phil is certainly enjoying himself:

"John McLain, Philip McLain and Hamilton McLain are holding a delightful reunion in Mitchell. Philip reached this city this week from the Pacific coast where he located 27 years ago, having recently sold his property in Oregon and is on his way to Florida.

John McLain, who lives at Gedes in Charles Mix county, came to Mitchell on Monday to enjoy the Corn Palace and meet his Pacific Coast brother.

The combined ages of these three men is 224 years. All of them served in the Civil war with northern armies, enlisting in the state of Michigan. John, who was with the Fourth Michigan cavalry, had a horse killed under him at Chickamauga, was wounded a few days later in a skirmish with General Joe Wheeler's cavalry and finally was with his regiment on the raid which resulted in the capture of Jeff Davis. His age is 77.

Philip, age 75, was in the First U. S. cavalry and operated with the Army of the Potomac.

Hamilton, aged 72, was in the Ninth Michigan cavalry and became during the war, one of General Kilpatrick's most trusted scouts.

The Gazette man was invited to dine with the old veterans and greatly enjoyed listening to their incidents and anecdotes of the days when they followed the flag in the Southland."

We received from Senator McNary, a copy of his speech urging the adoption of an amendment to the food control bill so that \$20,000,000 could be expended in the reclamation of arid lands as a war productivity measure.

In a recent public statement Mr. McNary said in regard to the two billion dollar war revenue bill: "I voted for the revenue bill upon its final passage as the war cannot be fought without money; yet I hoped that a greater portion of the revenue could have been collected from those colossal institutions which are enjoying the fruits of the war and are thriving upon the enormous expenditures made necessary by this world conflict. I would not advocate a revenue policy that would disturb or frighten business, nor would I support a measure that considers the profitters to tenderly."
