BE READY TO HELP ALIEN ENEMIES MUST REGISTER

Engineer Kingsley and a force of men are now surveying the post road from Baker to the Ingles' ranch, as soon as that stretch is completed they will survey Powder River Canyon east of Richland and then the Sag. Immediately after a survey completed, plans and specifications will be drawn up and advertisements issued for bids.

The 1918 program appears to us as being absolutely fair in every way, and we believe our citizens will make a very grave mistake should they fail to pledge the \$3000 apportioned to be raised in Eagle Valley, as that amount will bring \$20,000 for improving the road east of Richland the coming summer.

Several have told us that they thought conditions hardly right for such extensive improvements. Our reply is this: Oregon will spend a certain amount on roads this year; hundreds of other sections of the state stand ready to take advantage of the opportunity to secure the benefit of the funds they set aside in case this section should fail to make good; this makes it necessary that we raise this sum to get the work started this year, else the road tax and auto tax paid in Baker county will go to build roads in some other county.

No one will deny that the Baker-Cornucopia post road when completed will be worth many, many thousands of dollars to the residents contiguous to the route throughout its entire length. If the program as planned for 1918 is carried out, other portions will be built next year, and the completion of the road from Baker to Cornucopia in 1920 is assured by the State Highway Commission.

Ere many days every property owner in this section will be asked to contribute to this cause and we venture the assertion that it will be a short and easy task to raise the sum required.

Among the regulations for the registration of German alien enemies in the United States during the first week of February, are the following:

All German males of the age of 14 years and upward are required to register.

The affidavit of each registrant must be accompanied by four unmounted photographs, signed across the face so as not to obscure the features, and the finger prints of each registrant shall be taken.

Between 10 and 15 days after registration each alien enemy must again appear before his registration officer to obtain a registration card, which will bear his name and his left thumb print. This card must be carried by the registrant for future identification.

An alien enemy who changes his place of residence to another place within the same registration district must at once report the change to the registration officer. No alien enemy shall move out of the district without a permit. Application for a permit must be made upon a form furnished by the Department of Justice, giving full particulars as to date, reason for change, and intended place of residence.

All German aliens residing or being within the town of Richland or vicinity are required to present themselves for registration at the Richland postoffice and complete their registration on or before Feb. 9th, 1918.

As far as we have been able to ascertain, but four residents of this section will have to register, these are: Julius Frahm, John Schnau, Henry Sass and John Nave.

The funeral of A. J. Tarter was held in the afternoon last Thursday instead of forenoon as first announced, so that relatives from a distance might attend. The services were well attended and the sermon by Rev. Johnson exceptionally impressive. Among other relatives in attendance were R. A. Tarter of Boise, son; Mrs. L. Lloyd of Joseph, sister; Dreyfus Tarter of Weiser, and Lutacia Tarter of New Bridge, grand children; Claude Officer of Halfway, nephew; and Mrs. W. T. Bennehoff of Richland, niece.

Mrs. Geo. W. Martin was taken to Baker Monday, suffering severely from ear trouble aggravated by lagrippe. On Wednesday Drs. Pearce and Barton performed an operation, removing a portion of the bone from one of her ears, and at last reports she was getting along in fine shape although the operation was a very serious one.
