Some-where in France,
January —, 1918,
(Date cut out by censor)

Dear Mrs. Herr:
I received the Christmas box yesterday and wish to thank you and the rest of the ladies of the M. E. church. Myself and the rest of the boys in my room gave you a vote of thanks, for it was sure fine. Our diet for the last month has been quite a monotony, consisting mostly of corned beef altho' we have had plenty of that.

I have been away from the U. S. more than a month now, most of the time has been consumed in travel. Our trip across was very long and uneventful. All the towns I have seen in Europe are way behind our American cities. It is probably because most of the buildings were built before modern improvements were invented.
