The campaign for the sale of War Savings Stamps opened in earnest in Eagle Valley this week and from now until Dec. 31st interest in the cause will not be allowed to wane. J. F. Herr was appointed chairman of the committee at Richland and J. C. Bowen at New Bridge, therefore we feel confident that Eagle Valley and adjacent territory will be thoroughly canvassed.

Oregon's quota is \$17,000,000; Baker county's share is \$397,720—approximately \$20 for every man, woman and child in the county. Now is the time to loan your money to Uncle Sam in any sum you may desire from 25c up.
