AMERICAN SAVINGS WILL MEASURE WHEAT EXPORTS

"We have already exported the
whole of the surplus of the 1917 wheat
harvest, over and above the normal de-
mands of our own population. It is
necessary, therefore, for the food ad-
ministration to restrict export of wheat
so as to retain in the United States
sufficient supplies to carry our own
people until the next harvest.

"Therefore all exports of wheat
from now forward are limited entirely
to volume of saving made by the Amer-
ican people in their consumption of
wheat and wheat products.

"We continued wheat shipments for
December as far as our situation al-
lowed, but even with all the conserva-
tion made we were still unable to load
several hundred thousand tons of food-
stuffs urgently required by the allied
nations during the month of December
alone."
