TWO ENEMIES CAUGHT

Chas. Reed of Halfway, acting for Deputy Sheriff Garlinghouse who was ill, went to Cornucopia Saturday morning and arrested two alleged pro-Germans, bringing them to Richland where he turned them over to Deputy Sheriff Nelson who took them on to Baker and looked them up.

One of the men, named Fred Werner, claims to be an Austrian but is believed to be a German. He had made many treasonable utterances and had threatened to set fire to the buildings and to blow up the mines. It has been that he is a member of the I. W. W., enrolled under the name of Fred Wilezek.

The other gives his name as Anton Lopez and claims to be a Spaniard, but it is believed that he is a Mexican. He openly declared his enmity to the United States but made no threats. He had over \$600 in cash on his person when searched.

Just what will be done with the men is not yet known but the matter has been reported to the United States District Attorney. If they are proven guilty they will probably be put in prison until after the war—instead of being lined up and used for a target.
