## RED CROSS

For some unknown reason the people of Eagle Valley are not responding to the Red Cross call as they should. The total sum reported at time of going to press being less than \$800. Very few called upon have failed to give, but the amounts have been too small in most cases.

While the official figures have not been made public, it is announced that Baker will go over the top. McEwer, Huntington, Haines, and other towns in the county have reported that they would raise their quota at least, and probably exceed it.

We in Eagle Valley must rally and at least raise our quota of \$1200. But four days remain of the allotted time and less than two thirds of the sum raised. If you have given, study the situation seriously—think what suffering may come to some poor soldier for lack of Red Cross aid resulting from your refusal to give more—compare your present circumstances with that of the thousands of Americans on the battle line in France—search your very soul,—and if you can turn your eyes toward Heaven and say "I have done all I can do," well and good. But if you find you can spare another dollar, or a half dollar, send it at once for the sake of suffering humanity.

We are confident that Eagle Valley will "come through," but there should be no delay.
