Marine Recruits Wanted!

In order that every man between the ages of 18 and 30 years, either married or single, may have the opportunity of enlisting in the United States Marine Corps, every postmaster in Oregon has been authorized to examine, accept and transfer men for this excellent branch of service.

In recognition of the splendid record made by the Marines in the past and excellent achievements in the present war, congress has authorized the increasing of the Corps to 75,500 men in order that they may take over and maintain a separate section of trenches in France.

Registered and unregistered men between the above mentioned ages who are desirous of enlisting should do so immediately.
