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WHEATLESS RECIPES W.S.S. OVER THE TOP

Substitute flours may very frequently be used for white flour with any standard recipe, remembering to increase the amount of baking powder used.

It is impossible to state with exactness the amount of liquid to be used with the substitute flours, because of lack of uniformity, some being coarser than others. All measurements in the following recipes are absolutely level.

Corn Flour Biscuit
2 2/3 cups corn flour
1 teaspoon salt
6 teaspoons baking powder
3 tablespoons fat
1 cup liquid
Sift the dry materials together; work in fat well; combine liquid and dry materials, handling lightly. Shape as biscuit and bake in a hot oven.

Corn Flour—Rolled Oat Biscuit
Same as above recipe except use 1 1/3 cups corn flour and one cup ground rolled oats.

Rice and Oat Biscuit
Same as above except use 1 cup rice flour and 1 cup ground rolled oats. Grind your rolled oats in a meat grinder.

Oat Flour Loaf.
2 cups sifted oat flour
2 1/4 teaspoons baking powder
3-4 cup raisins
3-4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons syrup
1 egg (well beaten)
2 tablespoons melted fat
1 cup sweet milk (more or less)

Mix dry ingredients; combine with rest of material. Should be medium stiff. Beat thoroughly for about five minutes; put in greased pan, let rise for 15 or 20 minutes; bake about 45 minutes.

Corn Flour Sponge Cake
4 eggs 1-8 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 cup sugar 1 cup corn flour
Separate whites and yolks of eggs; beat yolks until thick and lemon colored, then add lemon juice and salt. Add sugar and beat until light. Fold in the well beaten whites of eggs and the sifted flour. Bake in a moderate oven.
