FROM TRAINING CAMP

We are in receipt of a letter
from Lindsay McArthur, Co. D.,
S. A. T. C., Presidio of San Fran-
cisco, in which he says:

"I have been here a little less
than a month and have gone thru
a pair of shoes already. Got an-
other pair yesterday; a regular
gun boat or trench shoe as they
call them. I've certainly got
some understanding now if I
never had before. This is cer-
tainly a good life—but they sure
keep you going. They started
out at a real good pace and are
now coming in strong on the fin-
ish. I am increasing in weight
right along and its all good
weight too, no fat. Tomorrow
we start for the rifle range across
the bay; we are also to have a 10
days' march with full equipment
sometime before camp lets up.

A person learns a lot here and
we have the best of instructors
in all lines. A Captain and Ser-
geant-Major, strictly English, in-
struct us in the use of the bayo-
net. A French Captain, who can
scarcely be understood, is our
'grenade' instructor. He is a
real fellow if he is small. He has
four wound stripes and was a
prisoner for 23 months. He tells
some thrilling stories but it is
hard to follow him.

San Francisco is full of soldiers,
sailors, marines and aviators. I
don't know how I will feel if I
get out of a uniform again. I
hope they will keep me right
here. Orders have come from
Washington which say that those
of age or over, recommended by
Col. Diehman, will receive their
commission in the infantry. The
age, however, knocks any chances
I might have.

The one thing which is empha-
sized here is discipline; no insub-
ordination is or will be tolerated.
