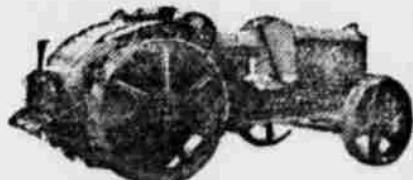

### An Interesting Letter.

Emslie O. Padgett, a former resident of this section, in a letter to relatives says:

"We had a good trip across, had a days ride on the train in England. We are away back of the lines training now. Have quite a time with the French making them understand what I want, but by using the words I have learned and making signs I get along. I buy a cup of milk from a lady next door once in a while and have bread and milk. There are not many young folks; the boys are in the army and the girls are working in factories. The grain is ready to harvest here some is already cut. They raise lots of vegetables. You should see how the women of this country wash. There are several big stone tanks around, set about level with the ground; the water runs in at one end and out at the other. There is a sloping stone around each tank and the women pound and rub the clothes on these stones. The water is cold and the tanks are right out in the street or road. You hardly ever see a 4-wheeled rig, all 2-wheeled carts; and where they work more than one horse they string them out one ahead of the other. There is lots of wine here, both red and white, but we are allowed to buy only a little of it. We get a canteen full of red wine for two

frances—about 40c. Have plenty of tobacco; they issue us Bull Durham now. I bought some in England and have it now and will have it for some time I guess, for it is sure bum tobacco for a Sammie."
