Dear Mother:— Just received your ever welcome letter, the first I have received in 4 months had just about give up hopes. I have written you at least 20 letters and from all appearances you have not received any of them. Oh! well we should worry the war is over.

Believe me I am sure getting tired of the hospitals, have been in the hospital since Nov. 10th.

I hope you get the card I had written to you from the hospital, and did you get the pillow top I sent you? Well any way am getting along fine. I thought for a while I would lose the use of my right arm but is coming along fine now, so there is no cause for worry. Will be leaving here in a few days. Will be glad—no, not exactly, for this is sure a beautiful place situated on the coast of the Mediterranean Sea. This is what you would call sunny France but believe me, before I arrived here I did not think much about France, altho I was in Paris for a few days and will say this much that it was sure beautiful. We are staying in a large hotel. Just listen a minute, do not miss any of this. Am sleeping in real honest to God beds with white sheets and pillow cases. And then comes the eats, yes sit

down to a table and eat. Was just out and had dinner with a French family. I have sure got my stomach full once more and had a good time.
