He enlisted on Dec. 13, 1917, went across the continent on a train made up of 13 cars, sailed for France on July 13th, was laid up with pleurisy a total of 13 weeks, and received his discharge on May 13th.

ROAD MEETING HELD

W. L. Thompson, a member of the State Highway Commission; M. O. Bennett, State Highway Engineer for Eastern Oregon; County Judge Doby, Frank Storgill, F. C. Oxman and Wm Meacham, composed a party that met with about forty of our citizens on Tuesday morning to discuss the matter of good roads in this county in general and the need of voting for the bond issue at the special election on June 3rd.

Mr. Thompson explained the status of the B-C postroad in detail and gave his word that both the Sar and Canyon sections would be under contract within a very short time, also stating that the State Highway Commission were much interested in the completion of the entire road as planned and that the survey from the Middle Bridge to Richland would be started in July and that work would no doubt be done on that section the coming winter. Mr. Thompson answered all questions put to him and his explanations were made in a sincere understandable way that convinced his hearers that the entire road from Baker to Cornucopia would be completed much sooner than anticipated.

Judge Doby explained the market road bond issue and the matter of the \$500,000 bond issue for Baker county, stating that if the issues carried \$150,000 of the latter would be expended on the B-C postroad while the former would provide funds for building and maintaining the roads connecting with the B-C and other postroads and state highways. His explanation clearly showing that Baker county now has an opportunity, such as may not be presented again in a life time, to secure both federal and state assistance in building and maintaining roads—in fact each dollar put up by us means three—and unless we take advantage of this NOW, others counties of Oregon will and our taxes will help them to have good roads while we have few if any.

The delegation went to Halfway and held a meeting in the afternoon, and we are confident that their visit to the Panhandle section has done much good for the cause of good roads.

Wm. Cooper, who has been in poor health for several years past, was taken worse yesterday morning. He is resting easier this morning, yet his condition is critical.
