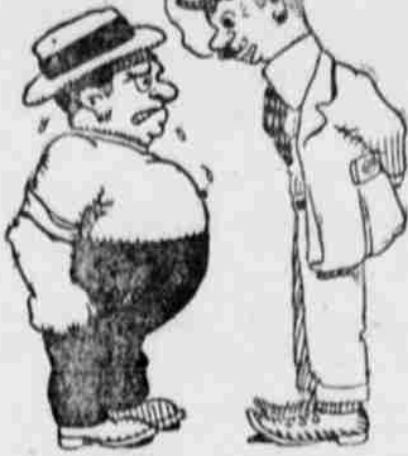

### A Bit of History.

Thirty years ago the Methodist church was organized in Eagle Valley with the following members: Dogan J. Saunders, Eliza C. Saunders, W. E. Summers, Nannie B. Summers, Rebecca E. Gover, Silas Carter and Cynthia Carter.

The next year Flora Fraser and Clara Waldron united with them and in 1891 were joined by W. C. Cundiff, Eliza J. Cundiff, Geo. B. Saunders and Lillie M. Saunders. Within the next few years a goodly number had united with the church and it has made some progress every year since.

The first society was organized in the old school house which is now a part of the E. & W. Chandler store buildings. In the early nineties the church put up a building in partnership with the I. O. O. F. Lodge, but both these organizations soon sold out to the school district and the Methodists purchased lots in Richland and erected a building at the present site. In 1911, under the pastorate of Rev. C. R. Howard, the church building was remodeled and enlarged at a considerable expense. But the debts have been paid, the building recently repainted both outside and in, and the church rededicated on June 15, 1919, by Rev. H. S. Shangle, D. D., of Milton, Ore.

Of the original membership the following survive and are still residents of Eagle Valley: Eliza C. Saunders, W. E. and Nannie B. Summers, and Rebecca E. Gover. Of those who united in 1891 all are here except W. C. Cundiff.

Since its organization the society has lost twenty-two members by death. The present membership is ninety-seven, most of whom reside in the Valley.

Work is maintained at New Bridge and Pleasant Ridge also in connection with the home church.

There are 180 pupils enrolled in the Sunday Schools with an average attendance of 115. E. E. and L. C. Holman are the superintendents.
