As if to counterbalance his very evident connection with the defeat of Furnish for governor in the recent election, as well as to satisfy the popular desire, Gov. Geer is to grant a pardon to Frank Ingram, the life convict who lost his leg in protecting one of the guards at the time of the escape of Merrill and Tracey from the penitentiary. While the pardon is in no small way prompted by charity and as a recognition of true bravery and a high sense of duty to his jailers on the part of the unfortunate convict, yet we cannot help thinking the act, while the man deserves his freedom, is more in the nature of a plan to get rid of him at the penitentiary, and unless the cripple has friends to look after him is an act of downright cruelty. He should at least be retained in the prison on some light work and at a comfortable salary.

If an extra session of the Oregon legislature should be called and the excuse is given by Gov. Geer that all state officers should be placed upon "flat salaries," we would suggest that the members also include in that bill the placing of themselves on a salary, and make it at least enough so they can pay their board and other necessary expenses. The idea of electing men to represent us in the legislature and have them neglect their own business for \$3 per day for forty days is the height of absurdity. However, if Geer calls the legislature together it will be to further his own schemes along for United States senator. The state officials' salaries to him are a secondary consideration.

The two escaped convicts' whereabouts at this writing are in Washington. If they are in the Cascade mountains they are—to use the words of the Oregonian—as safe from detection as if they were on the streets of Portland. A long list of burglaries and hold-ups will mark their location when next they decide to show themselves to the public.

Harry Tracey and David Merrill, the two convicts who escaped from the Oregon penitentiary, are probably the most talked about now of all the men in the state. Simon and Geer are not in it by comparison with those fellows.

Samuel W. Pennypacker was nominated by the republicans of Pennsylvania last Wednesday for governor. It is understood that Pennypacker is Quay's candidate, and that it is a Quay victory.

The delegates to the supreme lodge A. O. U. W., which met last week in Portland, were royally entertained, and will take back with them to their homes kind remembrances of Oregon and her citizens' generous hospitality.

The senate has again sat down upon the proposition of electing members to that body by direct vote of the people.

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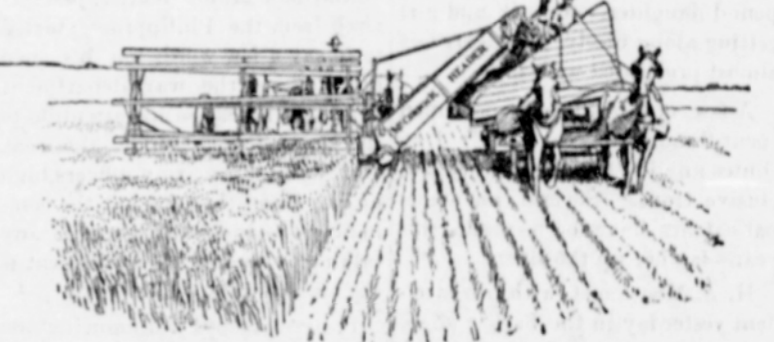
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
