We notice that President Roosevelt has reappointed several federal officials in Oregon, thereby recognizing efficiency and honesty. We do not know just when the terms of Messrs. Lucas and Patterson, the register and receiver of The Dalles land office, expire, but sincerely hope when they do that the president will see fit to reappoint them, as they are both gentlemen well qualified to fill the positions, and during their incumbency have given universal satisfaction to the people. When we have such public servants as these gentlemen are and have been, it is to the interest of the people to see they are retained.

Congressman Moody's bill allowing the Military company to select lieu lands in place of lands now held by them under government patent passed congress and is now a law. The bill is no doubt good so far as it goes, but to the settlers in Sherman county it will be of little value, as the Military company emphatically declines to give up any of its land in this county and take lieu land instead. In Gilliam and Grant counties it will be of some benefit.

This summer the board appointed to visit the obstructions in the river above The Dalles will make an investigation preparatory to beginning preliminary work thereon. May the day soon come when this mighty highway will be opened to free and unobstructed navigation.

Official Vote of Oregon.

Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar made public the official abstract of the vote for state and congressional officers at the recent election. The total vote was 92,920, and the republican candidates were elected by an average plurality of 15,036 votes. As the vote for governor is canvassed by the legislature, the vote for that officer is not shown. The returns heretofore published show Chamberlain's election by a plurality of 256 votes. The highest plurality is that of Judge Bean, who led by 17,135. The highest plurality where there were four candidates for the office was that of Dunbar, who led by 17,066.

The initiative and referendum carried by a vote of 5 to 1 and by a two-thirds majority of all the votes cast at the election. The total vote for the leading candidates was as follows:

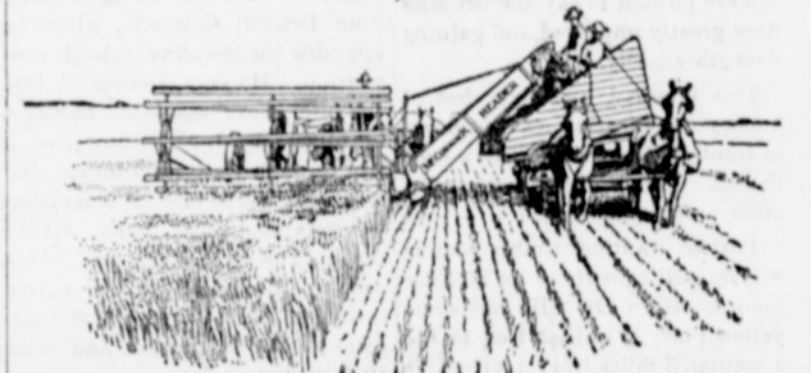
