In this one act Tracy has benefitted the public at large, although a wave of sympathy for the murdered desperado has begun to steal over the country already! Major-General Jacob H. Smith, who gave the order to his soldiers in the Samar campaign to "kill and burn," has been convicted of inciting his men to acts of violence and of violating the laws of war by the court-martial at Manila, has been placed upon the retired list of the army by recommendation of Secretary Root, the reviewing officer.
