Forest Superintendent Ormsby and Land Commissioner Hermann have put their heads together and recommended the secretary of the interior to withdraw another large slice of the heavily timbered land from the public domain. The largest withdrawal recommended is L-shaped, the base of the L running north and south along the Blue mountains, and the upright running east and west along the Strawberry mountains. These combined withdrawals embrace about 80 townships, including the headwaters of the John Day, Silvies, Malheur, Grand Ronde and Powder rivers, and their tributary streams, virtually the heaviest timbered land and best summer sheep range in Eastern Oregon. Evidently the department have taken alarm at the enormous quantity of timber land being filed on, and are making a stand to save some of our forests from the axe. Whether it will work a hardship on sheep-raisers or not is hard to tell, as already on the headwaters of the Deschutes and its tributaries owners of timber claims are demanding rent from the sheepmen; therefore it is a question whether it is preferable for these men to abide by the decision of the department as to the number of sheep allowed on the new reserve, or pay the owners of timber claims for their summer range. In either case the sheepman must suffer, and the days of the woolgrower who does not own his range summer and winter are numbered.

Sherman county cannot be seen to any advantage from the railroad alone. The Eastern homeseeker passing the boundary on the O. R. & N. cars only sees the sand piles along the Columbia, and is very much inclined to pass on to a country more pleasing to the eye. He does not know of the fertile plateau to be found a few miles from the river, and misses a chance of seeing some of the best wheat land in Oregon. If he leaves the O. R. & N. at Biggs and takes the Shaniko flyer he will see some of the county, but not by any means the best; to do this a team must be hired and some one who knows the country chartered to show the homesteader what prospects there are for a location.
