No better index to the prosperity of a country can be had than a universal rush for land. When all is said and done the fact remains that every branch of trade draws its support from the farm. Out of Mother earth comes the sustenance for every living thing upon it. When the prices of farm produce go down, down goes every other commodity in sympathy. If the land won't produce, or if there is no price for what it does produce, the farmer has not the wherewith to buy at the store; the storekeeper can't buy of the large merchant, who can't in consequence purchase from the foreign trader, and so it goes. Commerce is out of joint, and hard times result. The rush for land at the present goes to show that these conditions are reversed. Every product of farms in the United States can be disposed of at a fair price, and no better investment can be had at the present day than investment in land. To say nothing of farming land, timber and mineral lands are being filed on to an unprecedented extent. Every paper that is anywhere near the timber belt is teeming with notices for publication of timber claims. These claims cost over \$500 when purchased from the government, and are worth many times more, the East Oregonian notwithstanding. Sales of school land are on the increase, 40,000 acres being sold in July alone at \$1.25 per acre (purchasers paying as a rule one-fifth down and taking time to pay the balance). Parties who are hesitating about taking timber or mineral claims had better get in now, or every location, whether it be suitable for agriculture, grazing or timber, will be filed on or sold, and the procrastinator as usual lamenting.

There is little doubt the submarine boat will take a prominent part in the next big naval battle between civilized nations. Seven of these boats are being built by this government and a dozen or so by the French. The latter people have hopes of blowing the English channel fleet sky high some day with these contrivances.
