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FROM MANILA.

From the Aurora (Missouri) Daily News, kindly loaned us by J. B. Whelan, we clip a few extracts from letters of a Missouri boy, J. H. Hillhouse, to his sister, after the Manila victory:

He says: "The forts were pouring in shot and shell from all sides of us, and it was pretty lively for awhile. * * * Our ships fought terribly for about two hours and thirty minutes. * * * After the first attack, we went out about twenty miles and had something to eat and a little rest. It had been thirty-six hours since we had any sleep, and but little to eat during that time, having been kept upon a sharp lookout during that time."

Then, after describing the capture and dismantling of the forts at the entrance to Manila bay, in which the writer took part, he goes on to say: "Great was our surprise on coming in to see the flag-ship flying the rear admiral's pennant instead of the commodore's flag."

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CLIPPINGS.

In the new process invented by M. Chardonneau for producing "silk" from wood, the simple plan pursued, as given in the "American Silk Journal," is to work the wood into paste, which is dipped into nitric and sulphuric acids, dried, and placed in a bath of ether and alcohol at ninety degrees.

Another: One pint of molasses, one teacupful of butter (or butter and lard mixed), two even teacupfuls of soda dissolved in two-thirds of a cupful of boiling water, two teacupfuls of ginger; mix as quickly as possible with flour enough to roll out soft and thin.

Another: One pint of molasses, one cupful of sugar, one cupful of butter or lard, one teacupful of ginger and cloves each, one teacupful of cayenne pepper, one teacupful of soda, flour enough to roll very thin, and bake in flat tins.

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Snaps That Will Snap.

CINNAMON SNAPS.—One cupful of granulated sugar, one cupful of molasses, one cupful of butter, one-half cupful of sour milk, one teacupful of ground cinnamon, one teacupful of soda, and flour enough to make a smooth dough; roll very thin, and bake in a moderate oven.

Another: One pint of molasses, one teacupful of butter (or butter and lard mixed), two even teacupfuls of soda dissolved in two-thirds of a cupful of boiling water, two teacupfuls of ginger; mix as quickly as possible with flour enough to roll out soft and thin.
