Her illness was of the nature of dropsy, and although she suffered a great deal, she was very patient to the end. Her life throughout was very exemplary. She had not only lived out the allotted time, but had raised a large family to manhood, all of whom show her early training. She crossed the plains, and endured all the hardships of a pioneer life faithfully by the side of her husband, and kept in touch with the world, with all her faculties bright to the last, and when the last call came she was ready to answer, "Thy will be done."
