LIEBE VS. BATTMANN.
The Supreme Court at Pendleton lately rendered a decision in the case of Liebe vs. Battmann, reversing the decision of Judge Bradshaw. The case was peculiar in that one Schutts claimed to be the owner of a certain note and mortgage given by C. W. Battmann to R. G. Glover by right of gift. Geo. A. Liebe sued as executor of the estate of Glover to foreclose the mortgage, and was beaten in the circuit court, appealed and got judgment in the supreme court. This does away with the claim of Schutts to the note and leaves Liebe as executor of the estate free to enforce his plea for foreclosure.
