Teachers' Institute.

The Sherman County Teachers' Institute, which convened at Moro, Oct. 6th, and continued three days, was the best ever held in the county.

The attendance was large, every

teacher in the county except two being present. After a few well-chosen remarks by County School Superintendent W. H. Ragsdale, Prof. W. A. Wetzel, of Portland, took charge and conducted the institute to the entire satisfaction of those present. His talk on psychology the first afternoon was especially good, and showed a clear and practical knowledge of the subject. Then taking up the regular course usual in an institute, the Professor in a forceful and pleasing manner gave his class of teachers a thorough and practical course in the best methods of successfully conducting their schools, giving many useful hints for the common school where there are no grade systems.

Other interesting features were,

a paper on "Literature and the Public Schools," by Mrs. Lyons that was well received; and Mrs. Ina Dakin DeMoss read a paper on "Nature Study in the Public School" that was excellent.

Dunlap, Josie Spink, Beatrice Goodnecht, Lottie Vinton, Mrs. Ina Dakin DeMoss, Mrs. Roberts, Mrs. Lyon, Messrs J. W. Kerns, G. M. Frost, E. C. Peery, H. H. White, T. K. Roberts, L. T. Anderson, Joseph Kene, C. G. Morey, Porter and Jas. Herrin.

The first evening all in attend-

ance were right royally entertained socially, by Mr. and Mrs. Morley at their elegant residence. The second evening at the opera house the public were delighted with a short literary and musical program, followed by an interesting lecture by Prof. Wetzel on literature and its influence and uses in the school room. Saturday evening the public entertainment, reported last week, ended the short but very profitable institute.
