Why this is thus can only be explained by referring to the fact that we have shown to the world that we are a great nation—the greatest in fact that now exists,—great not only in our natural and acquired wealth, but great in our ability, if need be, to cope successfully with any other nation in war as well as in peace.

She squandered many millions of treasure, thousands of lives, and nearly all her colonial possessions in a vain endeavor to fight against fate, or an overruling providence, on the plea of being obliged to do so in defense of her "honor," and all she will have to show for her effort will be (if anything) a few paltry millions of dollars generously donated to her by the United States as a salve for her pride, injured by her losses in the late war of her Asiatic possessions.

JOINT EDUCATIONAL MEETING.

At a joint educational meeting held at Antelope on the 25th and 26th, between Wasco, Sherman, Crook and Gilliam counties, (Gilliam not represented) the following resolutions were adopted as a whole:

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR NEEDED CHANGES IN OREGON SCHOOL LAWS.

First—The financial year should be made to conform to the school year and end about the first Monday in July.

Second—It should be made more difficult to obtain state papers, and the fees charged for granting same should be reduced one-half, and said reduced fees should all go to the county institute fund with the fees for county certificates.

Third—With fewer state papers second and first grade county certificates should be re-issued as the result of regular examinations.

Fourth—Teachers should be required to attend the county institute at least five days, and, if during school term, be allowed full pay for the time.

Fifth—The State Board of Education should be authorized to prepare a course of study for rural schools.

Sixth—The members of the State Board of Examiners should be paid for their services, and should meet after each examination and grade the work of all applicants for state papers.

Seventh—The enumeration for the purpose of drawing school money should be changed from 4 to 20 years, as at present, to from 6 to 20 years inclusive, to conform with the ages for free school attendance.

Eighth—The term of the County Superintendent should be increased from 2 to 4 years, and only persons holding valid first grade county certificates, (or better) and having taught school at least 18 months in Oregon, should be eligible to the office.

Ninth—Qualifications for voters at school meetings and elections should be uniform for districts having less than 4000 population, (those districts having only three directors) and should include taxpayers and parents having children to educate.

Tenth—The law should clearly give to each district the power to decide whether or not high school studies should be taught in addition to the common branches.

Eleventh—The two present normal schools maintained at state expense are amply sufficient for the educational needs of Oregon for ten years in the future.

Power of the Fifty-First Psalm.

Its seventeenth verse, written by St. Augustine upon the wall of his sick-chamber, did not make the text any the less real to the great German reformer. The seventh verse of this same psalm was found on a tablet of copper amid the eternal snows on the highest point of the earth's surface, near Cape Beechy—"Wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow."—Last Days.
