BROGAN MURDER CASE.

The Brogan murder trial was put on in the circuit court at The Dalles on the afternoon of Wednesday last. A. A. Jayne and A. S. Bennett are conducting the prosecution, and F. P. Mays, Huntington & Wilson, and W. H. Wilson, the defense. By Thursday noon a jury was selected, and most of the afternoon taken up by the attorneys making a statement of the case to the jury.

The first witness for the state, Fred Wallace, was called. His testimony was confined to explaining a settlement he was trying to effect between Brogan and Forester as to disputed wages.

Antone Nelson, second witness, testified to the position in which the body of deceased lay soon after being stabbed. Frank Gum was then examined, and testified to Brogan and Forester having a hot argument as to wages, after which Forester quarreled with witness until the marshal came along and sent witness into the saloon. Gum further testified that himself, Brogan and McKee were in the saloon half an hour, when Forester and a man named Slim came in. Slim invited them to drink, which was refused by Brogan and witness. When Brogan refused to drink, he spoke to Forester, and said: "Frank, you have not treated me right." Slim then said, "Let them take off their coats and go at it." Forester took off his coat and stepped into the center of the room, whereupon witness took off his coat and knocked Forester down. Slim seized him (Gum) and choked him, and when he recovered he saw Brogan falling backward with his hand on his chest and fall on a bed. Witness saw Forester with a large knife and ran out of the back door.

On cross-examination, the attorneys for the defendant made a strong effort to break down Gum's testimony, and succeeded in confusing him somewhat, but did not injure his testimony materially. He was excused at 10:30, and court adjourned till 9 o'clock this morning.

This is all we can gather of the case before going to press.
