City Council.

Moro, Or., Monday, April 10, '99.

W. H. Moore, Wm. Holder, Geo. W. Brock, H. A. Moore, S. S. Hayes and J. M. Parry met in the office of Judge Meader at 8 P. M. Said gentlemen claimed to hold certificates of election as mayor and councilman for the city of Moro.

The meeting was called to order by W. H. Moore, and H. A. Moore was chosen recorder pro tem.

The following certificates of election, certified to by Wm. Henrichs, county clerk and ex-officio recorder of Moro, and sworn to before H. S. McDanel, deputy county clerk, were then handed in, to-wit: W. H. Moore, as mayor, elected to serve two years; S. S. Hayes, councilman, one year; Geo. W. Brock, one year; A. C. Sanford, one year; Wm. Holder, H. A. Moore and John M. Parry, two years; F. H. Meader, treasurer, two years.

Council then proceeded to business, Mayor, W. H. Moore, presiding.

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 4 of the charter, the council proceeded to choose the appointive officers.

An application for the office of marshal, by J. P. Stahl, was read and ordered placed on file.

N. W. Thompson was placed in nomination, and receiving the largest number of votes cast, was declared elected marshal for one year.

J. B. Hosford was placed in nomination as city attorney. There being no other nominations, the rules were suspended and the recorder instructed to cast the ballot of the council for J. B. Hosford. Recorder cast the vote as directed, and Mr. Hosford was declared elected.

The choice of recorder was passed until the next meeting.

Motion offered by councilman Holder that a committee of three be appointed on order of business. Motion was duly seconded and adopted. Mayor named as said committee Wm. Holder, H. A. Moore and G. W. Brock.

Motion offered by Holder, seconded and adopted, that the following four committees be appointed, each to consist of three members, to-wit: 1st, committee on fire and water; 2d, streets; 3d, finance; 4th, ways and means.

The mayor named as said committees: Fire and Water—A. E. Sanford, S. S. Hayes, G. W. Brock.

Streets—J. M. Parry, H. A. Moore, Wm. Holder.

Finance—S. S. Hayes, A. C. Sanford, G. W. Brock.

Ways and Means—S. S. Hayes, A. C. Sanford, G. W. Brock.

Motion of Wm. Holder that the recorder and mayor be appointed as a committee to procure a seal, books, and all needed supplies; motion seconded and adopted.

J. M. Parry stated Geo. Meader would allow council to meet in his office for \$1.50 per month.

On motion of S. S. Hayes council accepted Judge Meader's offer.

The following communication was then received and read:

Gentlemen of the council of the city of Moro: I hereby tender my resignation as councilman, to take effect upon its acceptance by your honorable body. [Signed] **JOHN M. PARRY.**

Mr. Parry's resignation was accepted. John M. Parry was then placed in nomination for the office of recorder. There being only one nomination the rules were suspended, and by
