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The English under the adminis-
tration of Gladstone had the cour-
age and manhood in the face of a
most galling defeat, to treat with
and grant concessions to the Boers
in South Africa, so says H. B.
Nicholas in his anti-expansion let-
ter to the Oregonian. If Mr.
Nicholas only knew the opinion of
almost every Englishman, except
a few peace-at-any-price old moss-
backs, and some few others who
stood by Mr. Gladstone for party
purposes, he would perhaps change
his views as to the supine policy
pursued by the English in South
Africa towards the Boers. No
doubt the situation in the Philip-
pines is analogous in some respects
to that of the British in South
Africa, but the course of events
goes to show that it would have
been far better if the English took
a firmer stand in dealing with the
Boers and obtained possession of
the Transvaal. Americans, Eng-
lish, and other foreigners in that
part of the world are subject to in-
sult and contumely, their title to
property is insecure, and although
they are the capitalists and back-
bone of the mining interests in the
country, they are not allowed to
have a voice in the government.
Even as we write eight British
subjects have been arrested in the
Transvaal on some frivolous charge
and thrown into a Boer prison. As
in the Transvaal so in the Philip-
pines. Americans with capital
who wished to invest and develop
the country would be so hampered
in their operations that they would
either have to sacrifice their busi-
ness interests or take arms in
their own defense, in which case
the United States would be com-
pelled to take possession of the
islands as the British in all prob-
ability will have to do with regard
to the Transvaal.

The British soldier is the best-
fed individual of his class in Eu-
rope. He receives for his daily ra-
tions 16 ounces of bread, 12 ounces
of meat, 2 ounces of rice, 8 ounces
of dried vegetables, 16 ounces of
potatoes, and once a week he re-
ceives 2 ounces of salt, 4 ounces of
coffee and nine ounces of sugar.

Stories of impregnable Filipino
strongholds melt away under the
American advance like frost in the
sunshine. The Filipinos have not
in a single instance been able to
stand an American charge.

If Gen. Miles had adopted his
present nothing-to-say attitude
from the beginning of the war with
Spain both he and the country
would have been better off.

The next Republican national
platform is likely to contain a sur-
prise for those who pretend to be-
lieve that the Republican party is
favorable to trusts.

It will soon be the mountains, or
the sea for the Philippine insur-
gents. General Lawton has forced
them back 55 miles, giving them no
time to reform and reconstruct their
shattered forces. There is nothing
left for them but to retreat to the
mountains, where it is said pursuit
will be impossible. This is doubt-
ful with General Lawton on the trail—a
man who hunted Geronimo's band of
Apaches no less a distance than
2,400 miles with two
companies of cavalry, and when
his horses gave out, followed the
Indians on foot, finally running
them down, and finally running
down an Indian to Geronimo's
camp and captured the whole out-
fit alone. Such a man is not likely
to leave a nest of guerrillas in the
mountains, or turn back until
every stronghold is captured, and
what remains of Aguinaldo's fol-
lowers are forced to surrender.

According to the New York Her-
ald's correspondent at Havana, the
situation in Cuba is critical. The
Cuban soldier looks on the offer of
\$75 for his gun as an insult, and to
all appearances the Cubans are
about to make armed manifesta-
tions against the United States.
Some persons say that the deter-
mination of the Cuban army not
to surrender arms is an outcome
of the refusal of General Brooks
not to sanction Gomez's plan for a
Cuban militia. Should the Cuban
soldier decide to refuse the money
offered by this government, and
decide to "hang on to his machette,"
it would be awkward to say the
least. Should hostilities commence,
with the exception of another call
for volunteers, where are we to look
for reinforcements to send to Cuba.

A traveler says in the Oregonian
that horses are abused on the
different stage routes in Eastern
Oregon, and thinks there is work
for the humane society in that field.
Just so long as stage routes are
let to the lowest bidder will this
order of things continue. Contractors
take a mail route without figuring
what it will cost to keep it up-
going on the principle of coming
out somewhere, expenses fail to be
met and horses are half-starved in
consequence. The Eastern man
who bids for the line can't be
blamed either, as they always can
find some reckless being who will
make a still lower bid for the line.
If parties held aloof and let these
guinea run some of the stage routes
themselves, there would be less
talk of inhumanity to horses and
fewer riotous conveyances to be
found in outlying districts.

It may be interesting to those
whose craniums have assumed the
appearance of billiard balls, to
know that an Austrian physician
has invented a method of trans-
planting hair on the human head.
The only drawback is the time

gets to the last hairs the first are
turning gray, and about ready to

W. J. Hosford, who made this
office a pleasant call on Friday
last, presented us with a copy of
the "Limerick Chronicle," dated
August 20, 1815, a short time after
the battle of Waterloo. We pub-
lish the following from this inter-
esting relic of bygone days:

The following appeared in our Sec-
ond Edition on Saturday last—
"The London Journal of Tuesday an-
nounce the arrival of Bonaparte and
forty of his suite on board the Beller-
ophon at Torbay, on Monday—his sur-
render is unconditional and accompanied
by the following Letter to the Prince
Regent, (which is stated to be a genu-
ine copy.)

"ROYAL HIGHNESS,
"Exposed to the factions which di-
vide my country, and to the enmity of
the great Powers of Europe, I have ter-
minated my political career, and I come,
like Themistocles, to throw myself upon
the hospitality of the British people. I
claim from you Royal Highness the pro-
tection of the laws, and throw myself
upon the most powerful, the most con-
stant, and the most generous of my
enemies."
(Signed) "NAPOLEON."
"Rochefort, July 13.
