GRAND ARMY DAY.

Memorial Services at the M. E. Church.

The new bell at the M. E. Church sent forth its summons to the good people of Moro on Sunday last to come and take part in the Memorial services held in commemoration of those who fought shoulder to shoulder during the civil war: a summons which was well responded to, as the beautiful church was filled to overflowing, seats being reserved for the Grand Army veterans, about twenty of whom marched in a body and took their places in front of the chancel, which was aglow with a profusion of beautiful flowers. Commander J. M. Parry, in a few well-chosen words, announced the services, which commenced with the song, "America," rendered in a splendid manner by the whole congregation. This was followed by the Invocation, after which the sweet strains of the choir were heard in "Gloria Patri," and "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean." The order of the day was then read by Adjutant B. F. Pike. Next came the Anthem by the choir, rendered in a most acceptable manner. Comrade Geo. Meader then read Lincoln's address at Gettysburg, which was much appreciated.

The Rev. Nickelsen took for his text the 12th chapter and 16th verse of the Book of Exodus: "And this day shall be unto you for a memorial," and delivered a most eloquent address, referring in appropriate language to the bravery and self-sacrifice of the men who fought on both sides during the civil war.

On the Coronation being rendered by the choir and congregation, the assemblage dispersed, deeply impressed with the beauty of the services.

On Tuesday a large concourse welcomed their way to the Moro cemeteries, where the Grand Army Veterans held their beautiful services at the grave of Comrade Neece, who lies there awaiting the trumpet call from on high. The graves of soldier and citizen were strewn with flowers; not were those of the strangers who sleep the long sleep under our gates forgotten.
