These waters are said to possess wonderful medicinal and curative properties, and already are being largely patronized by invalids from all parts of the Pacific coast. The following is what the Oregonian has to say about the springs:

J. W. Holman, who has been in poor health for some time, is making a prolonged stay at the hot springs near the mouth of Wind river, some eight miles above the cascades. He was in the city for a few days recently, and gave a glowing account of the virtues of these springs, which are known to comparatively few, although for many years they have been visited by people in poor health. They are owned by an Indian or half-breed, and no extensive accommodations have ever been provided for visitors, but a few can be made comfortable there. Mr. Holman thinks he has been much benefited by drinking and bathing in the waters, which are impregnated with minerals of various kinds, and which come from the earth as hot as there is any need of. He took back a horse and buggy with him, and proposes to make quite a stay there. Good fishing can be had in Wind river, deer can be killed, when necessary, and there is all the fresh air and exercise needful in climbing hills and roaming in the forests. A big panther was killed there a short time since, and all hands feasted on panther pie.

As the springs can be reached by boat in a few hours from this city, they might become a favorite health resort if they are as curative as Mr. Holman imagines, but the present owners have no means of making proper building improvements, nor any desire to sell the springs. Mr. Holman's friends will hope that all his anticipations in regard to his health being restored by a stay at the springs may be realized.
