Persons who are authorities on flax-culture, say Mr. Daugherty will harvest 20 bushels to the acre from his 75-acre tract. Allowing a dollar a bushel for the flaxseed, the superiority of flax over wheat in this case as a source of income to the farmer is very plainly demonstrated.

Ninth—Whelsharrow race, no entrance fees; purse, box cigars.

Tenth—Men's hurdle race, not to exceed 3 to enter; entrance fees 25 cents; purse, \$2.

Eleventh—Ladies' slow bicycle race, two best out of three, 50 yards, no entrance fees; purse, one cyclometer.

Twelfth—Men's slow bicycle race, two best out of three, 50 yards, entrance fee, 25 cents; purse, \$1.

Thirteenth—Ladies' road race on bicycle, no entrance fees; purse, \$1.
