Every sheepman knows that this innocent-appearing epistle means 300 or 400 head of sheep shot or poisoned out of every band herded on the section mentioned in the letter.

Market is quiet, as the season is now almost at a close. Some new wheat has already appeared on the market for sale. Very little Oregon and Washington remains on hand, and what little is doing is mostly for California old wheat.

Not until public opinion was fully aroused, and a fear of future developments brought very forcibly home to the officials at Washington, would they decide to send the volunteers to be mustered out at Portland.
