**How To Walk Upstairs.**

In any exertion of this kind, when the heart is naturally excited to a more rapid action, it is desirable that the lungs should have full play. The crouching position interferes with their action, the blood is imperfectly aereated, and there is trouble at once. Give the lungs a chance to do their work everywhere and at all times.
