He therefore whispered good-bye to his guard, and climbed through a small window, got on the roof of the old hotel building, from there to the roof of the barber shop, and from that exalted position he slid down the barber's pole, and took his departure for parts unknown, forgetting to leave his address to Deputy Sheriff Brown, who is making every effort for the recapture of the prisoner.
