A SOLDIER'S EXPERIENCE.

Earl Sanders Gives His Audience Some Idea of the Philippines.

Patriotism is not wanting in The Dalles, and the regard which our people have for their soldier boys, as well as the interest taken in their heroic deeds in our behalf, was evidenced last night, when, in spite of the many counter attractions, such a large crowd gathered at the Congregational church to hear Earl Sanders speak on the recent campaign in the Philippines and the experiences of the Oregon boys. As a general thing it is impossible to get even a moderate sized crowd to attend a lecture in The Dalles, but last night was an exception.

Earl was attired in his uniform, and presented a soldierly appearance as he took the rostrum, and was greeted by hearty applause. All had been anxious to hear the story of the war from the lips of one of our own boys, and it was a pleasure to listen to the speaker, who possesses eloquent ability which added much to its rendition. Beginning with the time the Oregon boys left Portland, May 16, 1899, he reviewed the entire campaign and their experiences until they landed at San Francisco on July 14, 1899, giving his listeners a better idea than they could obtain in any other manner, but leaving out the political side of the Philippine question entirely, which no one expected or cared to have discussed at such a time.

It will be impossible to go over the ground which the speaker covered in his address, and which was so interesting to his hearers, and made them leave the church well satisfied. One must hear it to appreciate it. —Dalles Chronicle.
