The citizens of Moro held a meeting in the opera house on Saturday night to ascertain the wishes of the people as to the continuance of the quarantine of families affected with the epidemic now prevalent in town. After fully discussing the matter, a vote was taken, with the result that a large majority stood for a strict quarantine. It is not the object of the board of health to work a hardship on those who are unfortunate enough to be taken with the malady, but every person of common sense will see that it is their duty to take proper precautions to prevent the spread of this disease, and it is to be hoped that our citizens will give the authorities their hearty support in any measures they may take for the public health. It was wisely suggested on Saturday evening that children be confined to their own yards and premises for a couple of weeks. This measure is surely not a hardship, and could be easily enforced by parents. We would also suggest that parties keep from visiting as much as possible for the next few weeks. If these simple precautions are taken, and the board of health upheld in their efforts to stamp out the disease, two or three weeks may see the town free from this sickness. On the other hand, if the people are determined to let matters drift, and throw every obstacle in the way of the board of health, it will be a long time before our town assumes its usual healthy condition.

We have been particularly requested to impress on the people of Moro the great necessity of disinfecting their premises. A few cents judiciously laid out in disinfectants may save several dollars in doctors' bills, to say nothing of the danger from sickness. We would suggest the following as good disinfectants: 1. Carbolic acid, one ounce; mixed with one gallon of water. 2. Sulphate of iron or copperas, in powder alone, or mixed with lime. Either of these sprinkled on floors, in closets, about sinks, etc., are very efficacious in absorbing foul odors, purifying the atmosphere, and destroying disease germs. 3. Chloride of lead; dissolve half a dram of nitrate of lead in a pint of boiling water, and 2 drams of common salt in a pail of water; mix the two solutions, and allow the sediment to settle. A cloth dipped in the liquid, and hung up in an apartment, is all that is required to purify the most fetid atmosphere. It is also good to throw down sinks, drains, etc., and to wash infected clothes in.

How to fumigate rooms: Heat a common shovel quite hot, and pour vinegar slowly upon it. The doors and windows should be opened at the time, as the fumes of vinegar are very irritating.

Another way to fumigate rooms is with sulphur fumes. Take two ounces of sulphur and place it in a kettle, close every window, kindle the sulphur, and leave the room; the door should be locked and no one allowed to enter for 8 hours, after which we guarantee no microbe will be found alive in that room.

The Kaffir's Revenge.

"While we have endeavored to spare our prisoners any unnecessary humiliation, they had to undergo one at Ladysmith which no doubt they felt very bitterly. It was the jera of the Kaffirs. As the Boer captives passed along the streets of the little town the natives hailed them with cries of 'Pas op! 'Upi pass! 'Pas op! 'Upi pass' is mixed Kaffir and English, and being interpreted is 'Where's your pass? One must have lived at Johannesburg to realize how derisive these cries were. To every indignity which the zarp or the Boer official inflicted on the Zulu or the Basuto, or the Swazi laborer; every lash with the whip as the driver passed him; every rough cudgel in the thoroughfare, much as some people would treat a dog. 'Pas op' was the preliminary. To stand by and call 'Pas op' to those very Johannesburg Boers who had heaped every indignity upon him was sweet revenge to the Kaffir, and bitter humiliation to the foe. 'Upi pass' was still more galling. The Transvaal pass law was an instrument of oppression which the officials employed relentlessly to fleece the native laborer. What 'Pas op' meant of indignity, 'Upi pass' meant of injustice. Of all the good things one may legitimately anticipate from the triumph of British arms, not one is more gratifying than to think that the long hard tyranny of the Boer over the black race will be at an end. To you and me the Union Jack at Pretoria asserts liberty and self-government; to 700,000 natives it proclaims justice which they have never known, and never would know under the brutal domination of the Boer. This one humiliation I am glad the captives were not spared.—Montreal Star.
